## The positive, habitual behaviors that we are expected to demonstrate in daily living.

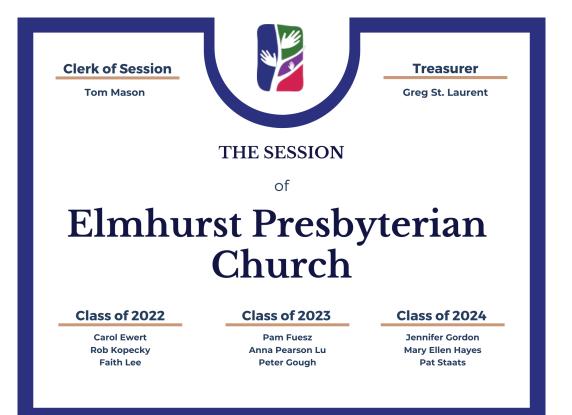

## 2021 Objectives

Deacons are called to serve our faith and broader communities through service projects, prayer, and personal interactions. Our theme during 2021 was *Connecting & Serving*.

## 2021 Activities & Programs

Your Deacons undertook a number of projects during the year, including ...

- Helping to organize the church picnic, held in our tent on a Sunday in September. (Dave Fuesz revealed himself to be a superb grillmaster!)
- Helping to make Popsicles & Prayers a regular summer event during which people had an opportunity to gather to share, learn, laugh, and remain connected.
- Coordinating a Drive Through Food Drive in April. We invited members and community members to come through the circle drive in order to drop off (or have EPC members unload) much needed supplies. This allowed EPC to supplement our ongoing support of the Elmhurst-Yorkfield Food Pantry with a much larger donation. (Thanks to our electronic sign, we attracted a number of donations from community members.)
- Deacons made personal stops at EPC members' homes to drop off Advent kits, which included candles that allowed everyone to participate in the important Advent ritual involving lighting candles for hope, peace, joy, and love ... all in anticipation of lighting the Christ candle.
- Creating *Thinking of You* kits for seniors. These included items such as pens, notecards, batteries, tea, protein bars, and hot chocolate. They were distributed through Meals on Wheels.
- Deacons also worked in support of our year-end Fill The Stable Program, that saw the wonderful stable (designed by Ray Lee) stuffed with a variety of much needed hats, gloves, scarves, diapers, and soup.
- Throughout the year, Deacons also reached out to members, through prayer, phone calls, cards, and notes.

## **REPORT OF TRUSTEES Submitted by Doug Fitzgerald**

Trustees are elected from the congregation to serve as fiduciaries who manage EPC's finances. The Trustees also acted this year to coordinate projects through a team called Buildings & Grounds, assisted with Stewardship activities, and supported the Treasurer in the creation of a budget.

## <u>Financials</u>

EPC concluded 2021 with total assets of \$1,108,285.96. The church's financial position benefited from favorable investment performance, pledge income that exceeded budget, the generous response of people who supported EPC through arranging to use parking spots in our lot, the ability to recognize the Payroll Protection Program loan granted in 2020 as forgiven, and careful oversight of expenditures.

## Financial Reporting & Governance

EPC continues to benefit from the hard work done by Greg St. Laurent, our Treasurer, who has adjusted our accounting and reporting system to be appropriate for a non-profit organization. Our financial reports provide you and your Session with clear statements of performance and trends.

During 2021 EPC engaged with an outside accounting firm to review our financial procedures, to ensure that they are being conducted in good order, that we minimize the chance for anyone to misuse EPC funds, and that they align with generally accepted not-for-profit best practices. The firm's report, which focused on the most important parts of our financial systems and procedures, confirmed that your church's finances are being managed appropriately.

## Buildings & Grounds



Three special projects were initiated during 2021.

Masonry work was undertaken to repair brickwork and caulking around the building. Restoration work that was begun in 2020 was completed as the tower on the Circle Drive had damaged bricks replaced and was re-tuckpoined. Painting on the building's east and north elevation addressed badly peeling window frames that threatened to cause substantial rot. In addition, the overhang that you see if you look up when you enter the building on the east side was cleaned and repainted as well.

New replacement doors have been ordered for the main entrances to the Nelson-White



Room and to the Narthex on the Circle Drive side. They will be installed during 2022.

Much of the grounds work is done by a dedicated team of volunteers, who gather in all kinds of weather to support the vegetable garden, Certified Monarch Waystation, and other landscaping. Special thanks to all who give so generously of their time and talents to keep our grounds healthy and beautiful.

Among exterior/system projects still to be addressed are repaying the Circle Drive, replacing/upgrading the HVAC units that cool the sanctuary, concrete replacement and maintenance around the building, and routine evaluation and repair of brick work.

## FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION REPORT Submitted by Peter Gough, Chair

The 2021 budget forecast an annual deficit of \$63k, but we came in at \$27k surplus, a differential of \$90k (k = thousands).

The main differentials are listed below:

- Pledges were \$45k above budget
- PPP loan was \$49k and was forgiven and became income
- Investment income was \$8k above budget
- Service income \$29k above budget (York HS parking)
- B&G spending 21k over budget
- Mission \$6k over budget
- Salaries \$6k less than budget

The above are rounded and I have not listed every item.

Please note that pledges include \$19k committed to the Afghan fund, this has not been distributed so does not show up in mission spending yet. So, this can be viewed in a couple of ways.

Firstly, that pledges were \$26k above budget and an extra \$19k was pledged to the Afghan fund, or secondly that Mission was \$25k over budget. Either way, the donations and distribution for the Afghan fund could not have been budgeted for at the beginning of 2021.

## The Year of Mission for EPC!!

This year, the congregation of Elmhurst Presbyterian Church dedicated their energy to mission work with great intention and with open hearts. The Mission Committee led the charge and church members showed up in so many ways to spread God's love!

As always, we, the Mission Committee, did our best to reach out to as many people as possible within our community and as far around the world as we could reach. We did this by gifts of Mission funds to organizations and individuals, by collecting donations and redistributing them to those in need, and by volunteering time and energy. We sought to be more "hands-on" in the Year of Mission in a few different ways, too. So below you'll find the highlights and accomplishments of our Mission Team for 2021.

•*Fill the Pews:* In January, we filled the pews with donated clothes. Many church members helped sort it all to be sent to the PADS guests that are currently residing in hotels.

• Blanket Sunday: In February, we donated \$200 to Church World Service.



•*Elmhurst Yorkfield Food Pantry*: Thanks to Alan West, who makes our monthly purchase, we donated 600 tubes of toothpaste and 600 bottles of laundry detergent to the Yorkfield Food Pantry this year. We also made a monetary donation of \$1,300.

•*Children Up*: We donated \$2,000 to Children Up. We are continuing to sponsor Lanyero Peasline and Olara Daniel. We were happy to hear that the first student we sponsored, Acan Rovister, is now a practicing midwife.



•*Cuba:* We gave our sister church in Cuba \$2,940 plus \$360 for the electricity of the well. We pay the transfer fee when we send these funds. We paid for part of their cell phone bill for 2021 and have committed to paying it (\$600) for all of 2022.

White Field Partners

• We helped Art & Suzanne Pitz's 503C organization *White Field Partners* to pay for the repair of a well in Sierra Leone. \$710 came from the congregation's donations and \$1,980 was given by Mission.

• DuPage PADS: While covid continued to change our world, our PADS site remained closed, but PADS continues to house those without shelter in hotels. They are also in the process of purchasing the Red Roof Inn in Downers Grove. Our site is currently used to store PADS supplies from other closed interim housing sites. We gave our annual donation of \$2500 to DuPage PADS. Diana Riekse, our PADS Site Coordinator, moved to Michigan. Pam & Dave Fuesz now serve as liaisons to PADS.

• Presbyterian Disaster Relief: We gave \$2,000 & it went to help those affected by Hurricane Ida.

•*EWAN*: We supported Elmhurst Walk-in Assistance Network with a gift of \$1,100.

• *Theological Support:* We donated \$1,000 to *McCormick Theological Seminary*.

• Personal Missions: Anna chose a student at her school who had just received a heart transplant. Carol chose an elderly neighbor who used to attend EPC who needed her spirits lifted. Alan chose a current EPC member who was struggling. All were given gift cards for gas, for McDonald's, or to Walgreen's.

• Pop-Up Pantries: We hosted 2 pop-up events in conjunction with We Pop Up for our neighbors in need in Bensenville-one in the summer and one in the winter. Each of these events is a massive undertaking requiring hours of planning, coordinating, resource gathering, and human power for the actual event. Our congregation showed up with *all* the requested goods *and more* in the weeks prior to each

event. Mission committee processed the donations and our church family members put in time and energy on the day of to help run the event. We had the best time connecting with each other & the people we served!

• *Furniture Pop-Up*: We started this mission in partnership with We Pop Up, but then we took it on as a church community. We collected gently used furniture and found people in need to give it to. This was a less formal mission that still had a big impact on several families' lives.

> • Erie House Christmas: We gave 40 children at Erie House gifts for Christmas. This was approximately \$1,400 worth of Christmas presents.

•*New Deliverance Diaper Ministry*: This year we made 2 large donations of diapers collected from church members to the diaper ministry at New Deliverance Church in









the Roseland neighborhood of Chicago. We also welcomed a group of their leaders to our service in the tent over the summer.

•*Elmhurst College*: In November, the Business students did a clothing drive with our space. Through We Pop Up, we distributed the collected donations to DuPage PADS guests.

•*Afghan Families Outreach*: Through the donations of our congregation, friends, and other organizations (and led by Cheryl Kopecky), we raised \$14,000 to help families from Afghanistan escape and come to the United States. We also received an additional \$5000 donation from United Methodist Church in Austin, TX to be put toward this cause.

•*Christmas Joy*: We collected \$650 in our Christmas Joy envelopes at the Christmas Eve service which will go to Presbytery.

•*Fill the Stable*: For our final mission of 2021, we filled the stable with gifts for Jesus and those in need. Our congregation gave 20 pairs of gloves, 32 hats, 2 pairs of earmuffs, 165 cans of soup, 12 packs of ramen, a McDonald's gift card, approximately 3500 diapers and 1800 wipes. All of these goods will be redistributed to organizations we partner with.

## Goals for the Mission Committee in 2022

This last year has been a full, busy, blessed year for the Mission Committee. We want to commit to making 2022 the same! To be clear, we hope and plan:

- 1. To *continue our partnerships* locally and abroad and continue our traditional annual commitments/missions
- 2. To explore *strengthening our relationships* with added efforts potentially in our Cuba partnership, in our relationship with our Guatemalan neighbors, and/or with New Deliverance Church
- 3. To *fill our committee* with members and friends who are called to do mission work
- 4. To *maintain a balance of mission work* in regard to who we serve (local, PCUSA, and global) and how we serve (donation of goods or money, spending time or labor)

*Budget*: For 2022, we asked for our line-by-line Mission budget to remain the same. However, we asked for Mission's portion to increase from 6.6% to 7.5% of EPC's total 2022 budget. If we are given the funds, our committee will pray on it and follow the Spirit to meet the needs presented to us in the coming year. We will prioritize increasing our church's outreach to local youth in need, especially those who belong to historically marginalized groups.

#### MUSIC MINISTRY & DIRECTOR'S REPORT Submitted by Susan Smentek, Director of Music

During 2021, I frequently used the lyrics of "Step By Step" as a guidepost to shape the musical direction of our Worship services.

Oh God, You are my God, And, I will ever praise You. I will seek You in the morning. And I will learn to walk in Your ways. And step by step You'll lead me, And I will follow You all of my days.

Seek, learn, lead, follow. Every week during the year, our musicians and technical folk (including those who wear multiple hats), have been called upon to do all four of those things: seek, lead, learn and follow.

We sought continued inspiration during the period from January through mid-April, while we worked weekly to produce the online Worship video posted to EPC's YouTube Channel. The sanctuary was our video production studio. We then helped to lead the transition to the outdoor tent Worship service. Special thanks to Paul Heinz, Keith Baumann and Brian Collins for their leadership and involvement in the weekly set up and tear down of the music equipment in the tent.

During the months of outdoor worship, we maintained creating and posting videos to YouTube. At the same time, Keith Baumann took on the enormous project of learning, updating, wiring and setting up the entire livestream system. Keith's efforts, with support from Rob Kopecky and assistance from Mike on Sunday mornings, have made it possible for EPC to offer connection to our members and friends from anywhere in the world.

Thanks to Gayle Bisesi for learning how to craft hymns and worship song videos from her home, as she did from 2020 through April of 2021. Gayle's return to singing live, outdoors and now, inside the sanctuary, has been a blessing to us all

The cheerful, talented presence of pianists Charlotte Jackson and Phil Videckis also enhanced our Worship Services.

Thanks to everyone at EPC for their love of music and their constant support. As we move into 2022, we continue to follow God, step by step.

#### FAITH FORMATION REPORT -Formerly Christian Education & Youth Ministry Committee-Submitted by Emily Culella & Faith Lee, Chair

The purpose of our committee is to nurture, educate, and learn about the children and young people of EPC. We make it our mission to know the children and young people and to help them grow in faith and love.

2021 was a year of transition, change, and re-formulation.

With this team, and the help of other more specific-to-event committees, we've worked through another pandemic year. In the summer, we had Wednesday night kids' events on the lawn, we held our biggest yet Pride event, and we worked in the garden every Sunday to help harvest a record breaking 444 pounds of produce for the food pantry. Faith and Emily also took several bike rides with the youth to get ice cream and to talk with them. They will cherish these silly and deep conversations forever. Emily also met one-on-one with some of the youth and together, throughout the spring and summer, they cleaned out the storage room upstairs and reorganized the shelves.

We came back into the building in October, holding Sunday school in person and on Zoom. The difficulty of a one-room Sunday school with ages from 4-13, while also being in a hybrid format, cannot be understated. With the addition of new families from our community, our total amount of children has more than doubled. Sunday school, while being a challenge, is also helped by professional teacher Allison Thoms. ## Highlights:

## **COMMUNICATIONS AND TECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE Submitted by Rob Kopecky, Chair Team Members: Erica White, Bill Berner**

### Adjectives:

In reflecting on 2021, several words aptly summarize this committees work:

- Inventiveness
- Visualization
- Persistence leading to Mastery

When it became evident in early 2021 that COVID mandated restrictions would prevent worshipping indoors, members of this committee brainstormed with the pastor about an alternate worship alternative. Through conversations, deliberations, research, and out-of-the-box thinking, it was recommended to the Session of Elmhurst Presbyterian Church that a large tent be purchased and erected in a portion of our parking lot for conducting worship services during widespread lockdown. *(Inventiveness)* 

The fact that the sanctuary was unoccupied throughout most 2021 allowed a small task force of church members to visualize how worship would be conducted when gatherings were again allowed, and how to broadcast our message to a new audience in a new way. (*Visualization*)

In person gatherings were again allowed during the fourth quarter of 2021 with an additional element ---

live-streaming the Sunday services over the Internet while simultaneously conducting in-person worship. Many church members were involved in the multiple tasks necessary to accomplish this goal, which included:

- Researching vendors who manufacture commercial grade audio and video equipment for broadcasting via the Internet
- Securing formal presentations of selected vendors on how their equipment met our needs
- Verifying references of users (churches) that currently utilize live-streaming equipment
- Requisitioning and ordering equipment from a reliable vendor
- Choosing an installation company with experience of dealing with churches that often lack the necessary sound and lighting apparatus required for live-streaming
- Upgrading the Internet service to accommodate simultaneous in-house and live-streaming presentations
- Researching, purchasing, and installing additional lightbanks in the sanctuary for enabling quality videotaping of live-streaming services

• Installing blackout shades in the band area to cover the stained-glass windows (during worship services only) that allows for a properly exposed view of the band during worship services (*Persistence leading to Mastery*)

The Communications and Technology Committee recognizes the valuable contributions of Jeff Hughart and Keith Baumann.

## Jeff Hughart

As a member of EPC and a former owner of a scaffolding company, Jeff coordinated, assembled, and donated large amounts of scaffolding needed to enhance the lighting in the church sanctuary. Accessing heights 40 feet or more above the ground could only be accomplished by a movable scaffolding platform. Jeff facilitated this entire project on a very tight timeline due to previously scheduled church activities requiring use of the entire sanctuary. It would not have been possible without Jeff's contacts and generosity.

## <u>Keith Baumann</u>

Keith, (also a member of the band), spent countless hours in researching and learning about the church's new audio and video equipment to optimize the live-streaming experience. Additionally, he trained several non-church members how to simultaneously operate both the video and audio components for in-person and live-streaming transmission. Because of Keith's technical ability and sheer determination, Elmhurst Presbyterian Church is now capable of providing high-quality live-streaming broadcast to anyone with a good Internet connection. We are monitoring the number of attendees who join the weekly broadcasts and I'm happy to report the numbers are increasing.

#### <u>Future</u>

Due to advancements in technology, the church has adapted new methodologies in reaching out to people. The Communications and Technology committee will strive to keep a tab on new ways to disseminate the teachings and beliefs of Elmhurst Presbyterian Church and to faithfully communicate those new pathways to our membership.

## Children's Vegetable Garden: "We Grow to Give"

The Children's Vegetable Garden was created in 2007 as part of Heaven & Earth Growers, a not-for-profit ministry conceived by Jan Happell and a few other members of Elmhurst Presbyterian Church. Ours was the charter garden and was later followed by two other gardens in Elmhurst. Those latter two gardens have stopped producing, but Jan Happell has since created a huge one in Wisconsin where she now lives. Altogether since their inception, the H&E Gardens have donated over **10,000** pounds of produce to food pantries!

In 2021 our own garden at EPC produced and delivered **444** pounds of organically-grown vegetables to the Elmhurst-Yorkfield Food Pantry—**our best year ever!** And although we had to wear masks for safety, **i**t was great to have the children of our church back in the garden this summer after a year off due to COVID.

## Beds and Borders/Lawn

In spring, we cut back perennials, transplanted and installed new plants, sowed grass seed, and started many days of weeding. We also amended the soil in the Memorial Garden as recommended by the previous fall's soil testing. In summer, we maintained the gardens, trimmed shrubs, removed invasive plants, and arranged for the leveling and sealing of the patio in the Memorial Garden. In fall, we raked leaves, collected seeds, and planted more daffodils. Throughout the many weeks of drought we kept everything watered.
